Dear member

We have continued to deal with fluctuating COVID-19 cases in the region, as well as working hard across all hospitals and services to tackle the backlog of treatments that have been disrupted by the outbreak.

HRH The Princess Royal opens lifesaving helipad

In March, Her Royal Highness The Princess Roval officially unveiled the helipad at Oxford **Road Campus.**

The helipad allows patients to be seen within minutes by trauma specialists, which can be vital to help save lives and improve outcomes during time-critical situations.

As well as unveiling the helipad, The Princess Royal visited the Antenatal Clinic and Delivery Suite at Saint Mary's Hospital, in her role as Patron of the Royal College of Midwives. The clinic won the Royal College of Midwives Midwifery Service of the Year Award in 2021.

Touring the maternity unit, she met with midwives, maternity support workers, doctors and families with their newborns.

Speaking on the day, MFT Chairman Kathy Cowell OBE DL said: "We were delighted to welcome Her Royal Highness The Princess Royal to officially unveil our life-saving helipad here in Manchester and to visit our renowned maternity services.

Sir Mike Deegan steps down

MFT Chairman marks the start of demolition

Demolition work has begun at North Manchester General Hospital (NMGH), in preparation for the transformation of the hospital site.

Kathy Cowell made a special visit to NMGH to give the demolition team a helping hand. She joined NMGH Chief Executive lan Lurcock in knocking down a section of Limbert House, which is being demolished to make way for a new Multi-Storey Car Park and Cycle Hub.

This is the first phase of the total redevelopment of the site, which will see a new hospital, wellbeing hub and mental health inpatient unit built over the next few years.



MFT's first helipad patient on the road to recovery

The first patient to land at MFT's elevated helipad on Oxford Road, Adam Dawson, is on the road to recovery after suffering serious injuries in a motorcycle accident last year.

34-year-old Adam was transferred to the helipad on Oxford Road by North West Air Ambulance in May 2021, just five days after the helipad officially opened.

On arrival, Adam was transported via the high-level patient transfer corridor by specialist helipad transfer teams to Manchester Royal Infirmary (MRI), which is one of two adult Major Trauma Centres in Greater Manchester, for urgent care and treatment.

Adam, who lives in Whitworth, Rochdale said: "I can remember everything. A car knocked me off my bike, leaving me with an open leg wound and fracture in my leg. "Police were the first at the scene and an offduty paramedic and nurse were thankfully nearby to provide reassurance. I remember it was raining so neighbours and bystanders provided shelter with umbrellas and made a pillow with their jackets which I was so grateful for.

"I never thought my first time in a helicopter would be

under these circumstances, but I was transferred to Manchester Royal Infirmary's Major Trauma Centre. I was in shock after the incident and feeling emotional as my wife, Tamara, had recently given birth to our five-week-old daughter, Elsie and I worried about being able to provide for my family."



Following surgery, a physiotherapist and occupational therapist monitored Adam's progress to ensure he was fit enough to go home. Adam was discharged from the Major Trauma Centre five days later and continues his rehabilitation at home with online physiotherapy sessions and follow-up care at MRI.



£40 million MRI transformation project begins

The next stage in the £40 million renovation project to improve the emergency care facilities at Manchester Royal Infirmary is underway.

In order to keep services running as building work progresses, the pedestrian entrances for the Emergency Department and Urgent Treatment Centre have been temporarily moved to the other side of the hospital building.

MRI's 'Renovation of Emergency Department' – known as Project RED – will enhance services across MRI, which is an adult Major Trauma Centre for Greater Manchester.

Improvements will include a more streamlined layout and ultimately increased capacity, including 10 (up from 6) resuscitation bays and 27 (up from 16) 'majors' cubicles.

Plans also include the creation of six new operating theatres, which will support the hospital's role as one of the regional centres for specialist surgery for Manchester.

In total, construction is expected to take just over three years to complete.

Ukrainian refugee children begin lifesaving cancer care at RMCH

In March NHS England announced that 21 Ukrainian children who were evacuated to England are under the care of NHS specialist hospital services and are starting their package of cancer treatment.

Professor John-Paul Kilday, Clinical Director of Paediatric Haematology and Oncology at Royal Manchester Children's Hospital (RMCH) was interviewed by ITV Granada and BBC North West Tonight about their status and care.

RMCH are very proud to be one of the seven hospitals to provide support to these children and their families at such a difficult time, working closely with partner organisations in the area to provide families with wrap around care.





MFT nurse receives MBE in **Queen's New Year Honours**

Dr Marie Marshall, Consultant Nurse for Transition at MFT, has received an MBE in the Queen's New Year Honours 2022.

As an expert clinical leader, Marie works collaboratively with colleagues locally and nationally to develop transition services that meet the needs of Children and Young People. For example, she has worked with adult diabetes teams to develop a transition clinic, which has seen over 1000 attendances over the past decade.

Marie is also the Nursing, Midwifery and Allied Health Professional Lead Research Champion for Royal Manchester Children's Hospital, supporting, mentoring and supervising colleagues to embed research into practice to the benefit of patients and families while also developing her own Post-Doctoral research portfolio.

MFT celebrates Silver Award for its commitment to the armed forces community

In September 2021, MFT received a Silver Award under the government's Defence **Employer Recognition** Scheme for its commitment to the armed forces community.

The scheme acknowledges employer organisations that pledge, demonstrate or advocate support to the defence and the armed forces community, and align their values with the Armed Forces Covenant. MFT signed this covenant in 2019.

At the special 'Armed Forces Day' ceremony, the Vice Lord-Lieutenant of Greater Manchester, Sharman Birtles JP DL, presented the Silver Award to the Trust's Group Chairman, Kathy Cowell OBE DL, watched by The Lord Mayor of the City of Manchester, Councillor Tommy Judge and Mayor of Greater Manchester, Andy Burnham, as well as MFT staff and armed forces personnel.



Lamp passed on at Year of the Nurse and Midwife closing event

In September, more than 300 nurses and midwives took part in a special event to close MFT's extended Year of the Nurse and Midwife 2020 activities and celebrations, at Manchester Cathedral.

The year 2020 marked the 200th anniversary of the birth of Florence Nightingale. The World Health Organisation (WHO) designated 2020 as the first ever International Year of the Nurse and Midwife, providing a "once in a generation opportunity" to celebrate the professions.

As some of MFT's activities and celebrations were delayed by the Trust's response to the COVID-19

pandemic, this was extended into 2021.

Teams and locations across the Trust have hosted the MFT Lamp, an iconic nursing symbol well recognised by the professions, which not only encouraged reflection on learning from the past but provided an opportunity to shine a light on the excellent teamworking, specialist skills and the pride our nurses and midwives take in their professions.

Symbolising the closure of the Year of the Nurse and Midwife, the MFT Lamp was passed by Group Deputy Chief Nurse Sue Ward to its final recipient during the event, Abda Hussain, a Staff Nurse at North Manchester General Hospital.

MFT's Joint Group Medical Director is the first female doctor to have won a national intensive care award.

One of Manchester's most experienced intensive care consultants has told of her pride at becoming the first female doctor to receive a prestigious national award.

Professor Jane Eddleston is Joint Group Medical Director of MFT and also works as a critical care consultant in Manchester Royal Infirmary. The Faculty of Intensive Care Medicine has just presented its Gold Medal to Professor Eddleston, the first time a female doctor has been given the honour.

The award citation highlighted Professor Eddleston's contributions in patient care, professional leadership and research, saying that "many working in intensive care medicine today have been influenced by her and many patients and services have benefitted from her vision and drive for improvement".

In memoriam

It is with great sadness that we share the news that one of our long-standing Public Governors, Ivy Ashworth-Crees, has passed away this August.

Ivy was passionate about MFT and has been a loyal and valued Governor for over 14 years, with her first term of office being as a Shadow Governor in 2008 in preparation of CMFT being authorised as a Foundation Trust. Also, I think we will all remember the scrutiny, challenge and focus she brought to the merger decision of UHSM and the acquisition of North Manchester General Hospital.

The Imaging Team at MFT were named winners in the Perioperative and Surgical Care Initiative of the Year category at the HSJ Patient Safety Awards 2021. Held at Manchester Central, the awards celebrated 159 finalists driving quality improvement in patient safety.

Maternity team named Midwifery Service of the Year



Colleagues from Saint Mary's Hospital (SMH) MCS were recognised at the Royal College of Midwives (RCM) Awards 2021 as the Maternity Team of the Year.

Musician and broadcaster Myleene Klass presented the Director of Midwifery, Kathy Murphy, and the team at SMH with their award at a prestigious ceremony in London.

This winning midwifery team has shown its commitment to continuous improvement, developing new initiatives to support both women and staff. These have included a smoking cessation service that has supported over 1,000 women, and establishing a six-day-a-week midwife-led scanning service for women in their third trimester.

Kathy Murphy, Director of Nursing and Midwifery at Saint Mary's Hospital said: "We're absolutely thrilled to have received this honour, a testament to the incredible work our midwifery team do each and every day. It's of course been a challenging year for us all, and I'm incredibly proud of the way we've all come together for the good of the communities we serve. Hive goes live this September

The biggest digital transformation project in NHS history is now here. In September 2022 Hive, our new Electronic Patient Record system (EPR), goes live. This innovative EPR system, powered by tried and tested Epic software, means we will have one Trust-wide record for each MFT patient. This means information will be available across the Trust no matter where their patient journey takes them.

By holding one MFT record for each patient we can improve patient safety and patient experience. Our staff will have easy access to up-to-date patient information as well as alerts for potential medication errors, allergies, and infection risks. Patients also won't have to repeat general information from their past appointments as staff will now have it to hand, using the new EPR.

As well as improving our internal systems, we're also introducing MyMFT – a brand new patient portal. With MyMFT patients will have greater insight and control over MFT hospital information – with fast, secure access to your data, and the ability to share that access with relevant caregivers and family members. Best of all, MyMFT can be accessed using a computer, smartphone or tablet device!

Hive's much-anticipated launch follows years of exhaustive planning and design work, carried out by a dedicated team of MFT medical, support and corporate staff, as well as technicians, and eager volunteers. The Hive system is a testament to their hard work, professionalism and overwhelming commitment to patient health and wellbeing.

Of course, we know that positive change takes time, and we thank you for your continued support and patience as Hive gets fully up to speed over the next few months!



Your Governors and Members in action

As an NHS Foundation Trust, we are accountable to our members, who include our patients, local residents, staff and stakeholders.

Our Governors are the link between our Members and our Board of Directors who make the decisions about our services. At MFT, we have 32 Governors, the majority (24) of which are elected directly from and by our Members. The last few years have been extremely challenging, with all of us being affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. To keep everyone as safe as possible, this has again had an impact on our usual programme of Governor and Membership engagement activities and associated meetings and events.

Despite these challenges, MFT's Group Chairman has continued to ensure that Governors are kept up to date by providing a virtual forum. During these virtual meetings, Governors actively seek assurance from Group Non-Executive and Executive Directors alongside receiving key information and updates to support them to fulfil their role.

On behalf of members and the wider-general public our Governors have received regular health-related updates, with some of the key areas including:

- MFT's strategic aims and annual plan for 2022/23.
- MFT service transformation and recovery plans and associated funding plans.
- The ongoing integration and redevelopment of North Manchester General Hospital.
- Key development information around the progress of the Trust's Electronic Patient Record 'Hive'.
- The introduction of Integrated Care Systems and how Greater Manchester's will operate moving forward.

Our Governors have embraced the new ways of working that have been deployed and have consistently ensured that they carry out their roles with flexibility, commitment and enthusiasm. The Trust's robust governance processes have also ensured that all Governors' statutory duties have been fulfilled. This has included active involvement in the Group Chairman's and Non-Executive Directors' appraisal processes.

Over the past reporting year (2021/22), alongside the reappointment of two Group Non-Executive Directors (Barry Clare and Dame Sue Bailey), our Council of Governors approved two new Group Non-Executive Director appointments, Angela Adimora and Gaurav Batra (Pictured).

Governor Elections 2022

Ultimately it will help to improve clinical quality and patient and staff experience, increase operational efficiency and drive research and innovation.

This plan describes the actions that the Hospitals, Managed Clinical Services, Local Care Organisation and corporate teams intend to take in 2022/23. Going forward, a set of measures will be used to review whether or not we have achieved what we set out to do.

Improving and saving lives through Research and Innovation

Research and Innovation (R&I) at MFT continues to improve and save lives through cutting-edge scientific breakthroughs and discoveries, translated into new tests, treatments, innovations, products, and services for our diverse patients and population. During 2021/22 more than 17,000 participants were recruited to clinical studies, with over 1.400 studies active.

R&I takes place across our hospitals, community settings, and clinical specialties – providing patients with opportunities to be the first in the UK, Europe, and the world, to take part in clinical research studies.

The skills, expertise, and experience of our staff, coupled with our world-class facilities and hosted R&I infrastructure across Greater Manchester, have continued to be utilised as part of a coordinated global effort to continue the understanding and development of treatments and vaccines for COVID-19.

Despite the uptake of the COVID-19 vaccination, new variants meant it was critical to keep researching new ways to tackle the virus. Working in partnership with The University of Manchester and US pharmaceutical company Gritstone bio, Inc., MFT was chosen as the chief study site to trial one of the world's first multivariant COVID-19 vaccines. Our newly formed R&I Vaccine Team delivered the early phase trial - involving a small number of people to be the first in the world to be given the treatment - at the NIHR Manchester Clinical Research Facility at Manchester Royal Infirmary, to an initial participant group aged 60 years and above.

Despite the challenges faced due to the pandemic, we have continued to lead the way in world-first treatments and trials, and R&I has been crucial in establishing new ways of clinical working and treatment in a post-pandemic world. The

Pharmacogenetics to Avoid Loss of Hearing (PALoH) study, delivered at Saint Mary's Hospital and supported by the Manchester **Biomedical Research** Centre (BRC), was instrumental in developing

a world-first bedside genetic test that could save the hearing of hundreds of newborn babies every year. Following a successful pilot the NHS will begin the roll-out of the test as part of the NHS Long Term Plan.

Due to the expertise of our

researchers in gene therapy studies, MFT has been chosen as the only UK site, and one of only five across Europe, to deliver a revolutionary life-saving gene therapy, Libmeldy. With a reported list price of more than £2.8 million – making it the

most expensive drug in the world the treatment will become available on the NHS as a specialist service and will be delivered within RMCH in collaboration with Manchester's Centre for Genomic Medicine at Saint Mary's Hospital.

Following results from the Palisade (Peanut Allergy Oral Immunotherapy Study of AR101 for Desensitization) trial delivered at the Manchester CRF at RMCH, children in the UK will be able to receive Palforzia - a lifechanging oral treatment for peanut allergies – as NHS standard of care following approval for use by the National Institute for Health and Care Excellence (NICE).

In recognition of MFT's reputation as a world-leading hospital trust for digital health technologies, we joined with international partners to became part of the Smart Hospital Alliance (SHA) to drive the expansion of cutting-edge digital health technologies for the benefit of our patients and communities. We were also selected by the Health Foundation, an independent charity, to be part of its new programme supporting health care providers to create the conditions to enable faster and more effective uptake of innovations and improvements to improve health outcomes for the diverse population the Trust serves. We have also joined a growing group of like-minded organisations working together to utilise health data for research and innovation to benefit the public, as part of the UK Health Data Research Alliance.

And following the arrival of our state-of-the-art Research Van in late 2021 we are now able to bring our ground-breaking R&I closer to our communities and widen opportunities to take part in research by visiting easy-to-reach locations such as community centres and supermarket car parks. The purpose-built one-stop mobile facility - only the second of its type in the country – includes a pharmacy and clinical area containing all equipment necessary to run vaccine programmes, clinical trials, and bespoke clinical projects out in the community.

The past few years have been challenging for us all and we would like to 'thank you' for the kindness, support and overwhelming positive sentiments received as part of our 'Love Letter to the NHS' campaign (2021) – some of the comments received are shared below:

We were pleased that Arena Attack survivor and Royal Manchester Children's Hospital patient Freya Lewis was able to run in the children's hospital colours again this year, while Mayor Andy Burnham donned a blue top to run in support of Manchester Foundation Trust Charity.

Freya was just 14 years old when she was injured in the blast. Sadly she lost her best friend Nel Jones in the attack along with 21 other concert goers.

Andy has spoken on many occasions of his support for the NHS, particularly during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Andy told the press: "I'm proud to be running on behalf of MFT Charity and raising funds to support its hospitals. It's the very least I can do to say thank you to those who do amazing things to keep the rest of us safe."

Guinness World Record

One of our fundraising families now has a place in the history books after raising more than £7,000 for our Charity and bagging a Guinness World Record in the process.

Tom Finkill received the internationally renowned accolade for "longest online quiz live stream" at 48 hours, 11 minutes and 7 seconds. The quiz was hosted in August 2021 but the record only became official in July 2022, after Tom was in constant communication with the organisation to supply evidence, witness signatures, and get the attempt verified.

Tom started hosting online quizzes during lockdown and to date has raised more than £15,400 for Royal Manchester Children's Hospital Charity. The family were inspired to support the children's hospital after daughter Sofia was treated there for her development dislocation of the hip (DDH).
