MFT given the green light for new CDC in Harpurhey

Manchester University NHS Foundation Trust are delighted to announce that it has received ministerial approval for a new Community Diagnostic Centre to be located within the North City Family & Fitness Centre in Harpurhey. A vacant area of the building will be converted into clinic space over the coming months.

The CDC will offer cardiorespiratory and ophthalmology testing, as well as Magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) and computerised tomography (CT) scans. We aim to have some services in place by the end of 2023, with the remainder in place by April 2024.

The new CDC will allow patients based in North Manchester to access planned diagnostic care nearer to their home, without the need to attend acute hospital sites. This results in shorter waiting times and a reduced risk of appointments being cancelled.

Engaging with our Chinese Community

During the session the Wai Yin Society shared information about our CDC services with their members and ran a series of focus groups. The focus groups focused on the barriers faced by the Chinese community when attending diagnostic appointments and provided plenty of food for thought for the CDC team.

Feedback from the session highlighted the importance of having access to Cantonese interpreters when calling to rebook appointments, as well as being sent text message reminders a few days before appointments.

We're looking forward to engaging more with our Chinese community throughout the rest of the year!

A spotlight on Endoscopy

About Endoscopy

The Endoscopy Service is an integral part of the CDC model, and currently runs services on behalf of the CDC Programme at both Withington Community Hospital and Trafford General Hospital. The proposed new build at Withington will host a 2 Room Endoscopy Unit along with facilities to run an outpatient clinic allowing for one stop clinics for patients who it is suspected may have cancer.

The new building will also host Bowel Cancer Screening lists, Diagnostic Colonoscopies and Trans-nasal Endoscopies for patients on both cancer and routine pathways.

Meet some of the Endoscopy Team



This is Gemma Dickinson – She is the Clinic Co-ordinator for the CDC hub at Withington Hospital, currently based at Manchester Royal Infirmary while the plans and build for the new unit are completed.

We have also recruited Kelsia who will assist in the scheduling of patients. We are looking forward to her joining the team in August!

The Senior Nursing team at Manchester Royal Infirmary (MRI) Endoscopy Unit have also successfully recruited and trained a cohort of nurses for the first phase of the CDC roll out.

Joann, Shirley and Anju (pictured below) are nurses employed and based at MRI's endoscopy unit. They rotate across sites to cover CDC activity at Withington Community Hospital (WCH), where there is currently one endoscopy room within the existing treatment centre.



This room is utilised each day and patients who need Lower Gastrointestinal (LGI) endoscopy procedures are listed, including patients from the Bowel Cancer Screening Programme (BCSP).

Although challenging at first, cross site working has proved beneficial for the team as they work closely with the existing team at WCH to build working relationships.
