University Hospital NHS of South Manchester The Specialist Nurse in Organ Donation will support a family throughout their decision regarding organ donation.

The nurse will spend time with the family explaining the process and answering any questions.

If a family chooses to proceed with donation, the nurse will remain with their loved one throughout the donation surgery.

Follow up care, including home visits, is also provided by the Specialist Nurse as continued support for the bereaved family.

Offering an end of life choice

If your loved one is critically ill, you may be asked to think about the option of organ donation when they die.

This is a normal part of end of life care within the hospital.

Our staff will be sensitive to your personal wishes and will support you in whatever decision is right for you.

Paul died on 14th March 2012 aged 47.

He had tragically suffered a brain haemorrhage. Paul was a kind, caring person, and his family felt he would have wanted to donate organs in the event of his death.

Thanks to Paul's gift and the remarkable courage and support of his family, three people had a second chance of life.

How to register

Even when you have joined the NHS Organ Donor Register, in the event of your death specialist staff will ask your family before recovering organs and tissue. Please discuss your thoughts with your loved ones. Knowing and understanding your wishes can really help to make this important decision a little easier.

Bringing comfort at a time of loss

Some or all of the following can be transplanted: skin, tissue, eyes, kidneys, heart, liver, lungs, pancreas and the small bowel.

It is a common misconception that only young, fit and healthy individuals can donate organs. In fact, some donors are in their 80's. Many common illnesses do not exclude the possibility of donation. Eyes have been successfully transplanted from donors as old as 104 years.

During 2011-2012 there were 120 organ donors from the North West of England. Remarkably, through their kind gifts they have helped 311 people receive transplants. Of these donors, 8 had been patients cared for at the University Hospital of South Manchester.
