The NHSBT and Therapeutic Apheresis Services (TAS) provide lifesaving and life enhancing treatments to adults and children, operating from 8 units across England. We wanted to highlight the great work they do in this issue and let you know that TAS has recently joined forces with the Manchester Royal Infirmary (MRI). Since mid-October 2022 they have commenced a collaborative adult emergency red cell exchange service for patients with sickle cell disease who present to hospitals served by the MRI Specialist Haemoglobinopathy Team (SHT).

This new pathway delivers the emergency provision of automated red cell exchange as an outreach service, providing equality in healthcare and improving access to emergency apheresis in the region.

The first patient to be treated on the new emergency red cell exchange pathway was referred from the Royal Bolton Hospital on 25th October after presenting with a sickle chest crisis. NHSBT subsequently travelled to treat a patient at Leighton Hospital on 28th November who presented in chest crisis also.

NORTH WEST SICKLE CELL PATIENT EVENT 2022

The global pandemic severely hampered the opportunity for the Haemoglobinopathy Coordinating Centres across the country to hold patient events. However, with the easing of restrictions, and the country returning to some sort of normality, the North West HCC was able to hold its first sickle cell engagement event. This collaboration between MRI, RMCH, MLCO, NHSBT and patient representatives across the region took place on Saturday 12th November at Citylabs 1.0, Manchester.

The event explored health care roles, new treatments, transition of care, patient experiences of living with sickle cell, introduction to the community team, support with bills management, red cell exchange and what to expect, education, career and sickle cell's impact on holistic wellbeing.

As well as the presentations and education it was also a time for people to come together. It was a fantastic opportunity for people to share experiences and benefit from the community spirit. Additionally, there were fun activities for all ages including a kids dancing competition and a raffle where almost everyone won a prize. More than 80 people attended and many asked if more events like this could take place, which we definitely have planned. UPDATES FROM ACROSS THE NORTH

Teams around the region have provided sickle cell, thalassaemia and RIA related updates.

Alder Hey, Liverpool

The team at Alder Hey are pleased to announce they have registered 6 patients for voxelotor. Those that have already started the treatment are doing well. Hydroxycarbamide has been offered to 100% of eligible sickle cell patients. 97.3% of patients are on hydroxycarbamide and are monitored by a well-established nurse led clinic. This winter, working closely with the immunisation team, flu jabs have been coordinated at the same time as routine clinic appointments so it can be offered to as many patients as possible.

Bradford

Plans for the new and dedicated transfusion unit are moving forward. Posters on the ward and at The Meadows have information on how to send ideas and suggestions online regards the design and decor of the unit. The next Listening Event on 01/03/23 will be an opportunity to update the progress and plans, and to receive feedback on these.

A new clinical psychologist has been appointed and is due to join the team in February. Dr Kiran Kauser is experienced in supporting people with chronic health conditions using a range of therapeutic approaches and will be a welcome addition to our team.

Sheffield

Sophie Basford has joined Lisa Kirk in the CNS team and is working closely with in-patient and day ward teams to deliver support and education. Additionally, funding has been confirmed for a benefits advisor to be in place to support HBO/RIA patients. An appointment announcement will be made in the next HCC newsletter.
