The inspection was our first since the Trust was established, and took place in autumn 2018 in what was the largest comprehensive inspection ever carried out in the NHS by the CQC. A huge thank you and well done to everyone who helped us to achieve these ratings.

Another highlight of the past year was the second ever MFT Excellence Awards, where our incredible staff were honoured in a special ceremony. You can find out who walked away as worthy winners on pages 4 and 5.

I'm pleased to say that one of these developments will be our new state-of-the-art helipad, for which construction work has now begun. The new helicopter landing site, being built on the roof of Grafton Street car park on Oxford Road, will enable critically ill or injured babies, children and adults to be airlifted straight to four of our hospitals to better access our worldleading, specialist services.

While we are still a relatively new organisation, several of our hospitals celebrated the 10th birthday of the new hospital buildings on our Oxford Road Campus this summer including Royal Manchester Children's Hospital, Manchester Royal Eye Hospital, Saint Mary's Hospital and the Manchester Royal Infirmary extension. You can read more about these special celebrations on pages 8 and 9.

More recently I attended our annual Young Person's Open Day and had the pleasure of speaking to young people about their interest in careers in the NHS and at MFT, as well as their enthusiasm for shaping the future of healthcare and research innovation. I think what stood out most to me was seeing how young people continue to passionately hold us to account to innovate and push the boundaries, for themselves and for the next generation, and how we as a Trust, which serves such a huge and diverse population, continue to be informed and inspired by these new ways of thinking.

MFT achieves Good rating from CQC

The Care Quality Commission (CQC) rated Manchester **University NHS Foundation** Trust (MFT) Good following the organisation's first inspection since becoming a newly established NHS Trust in October 2017. Two of our specialist hospitals received an overall rating of Outstanding, as did our Critical Care and Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS).

MFT was visited by more than 120 CQC inspectors over a six week period in autumn 2018 in what was the largest comprehensive inspection ever carried out in the NHS by the CQC. In their report released in March 2019 health regulator, the CQC, rated MFT Good with a significant number of Outstanding features.

Two MFT hospitals are rated Outstanding – the Manchester Royal Eye Hospital and the University Dental Hospital of Manchester. Manchester Royal Eye Hospital is the only Eye Hospital in

CAMHS are rated Outstanding, as are Critical Care. There were also 24 individual indicators rated Outstanding for individual key lines of enquiry across the Trust.

MFT Chief Executive Sir Michael Deegan said: "As the largest NHS Trust in the country and a leading provider of specialist healthcare services, this Good rating provides our patients with significant assurance about the quality of care they can expect to receive from MFT, whether that is in one of our hospitals, the community or in their home.

"To have received an overall Good rating for MFT, so soon after our merger to create the largest acute Trust in the UK, is a significant achievement and testament to the dedication of

staff across all MFT services. This now provides us with a fantastic basis on which to move to 'Outstanding' in the future."

Six MFT hospitals were rated Good. The Manchester Local Care Organisation, which provides comprehensive community services across the City of Manchester and was formed in April 2018, was also rated Good.

The CQC follows five key lines of enquiry (the way in which they measure services) which are Caring, Safe, Effective, Responsive and Well-led. Overall for Caring MFT was rated Outstanding, with the other four rated Good.

As with any inspection, the CQC identified a number of areas where MFT needs to make improvements and the Trust will be focussing on these in the coming months ahead.

MFT EXCELLENCE AVVARDS

We held our second ever MFT Excellence Awards in March, recognising the outstanding work that our staff and teams do in caring for our patients and supporting colleagues. Congratulations to all our incredible winners and finalists – the calibre of the nominations was exceptionally high.

Special thanks to everyone involved in the awards process: nominators, judging panels, nominees, sponsors, the organising team and our host Andy Crane, who gave his time for free to make the event even more special for colleagues.

What sort of projects have you been involved in recently?

Over the last couple of months I have been on a fascinating journey discovering and visiting various key services provided by MFT including the Emergency Department and associated wards at the Royal Manchester Children's Hospital, touring Saint Mary's Hospital and, in particular, the Genomics Centre where much of the future developments in personalised medicine are occurring. I have also been fortunate to see the exciting and extremely innovative Blood Sciences departments at the Oxford Road site, and was especially enthused by the Artificial Intelligence (AI) developments that have been made. I was also heartened to see and hear about the growth of 'closer-tohome' developments in acute care at Withington Community Hospital and Altrincham Hospital which I feel will be of value to patients and their carers and families.

What are some of your highlights from this year?

Another very interesting duty (and pleasure) I undertook as an Elected Governor towards the end of June both last year and this year was joining fellow Governors on the Governor and Foundation Trust Membership stall for the annual Young People's Open Day event. We spoke with hundreds of young people, aged from 14 to early 20s, who came to discover the vast variety of careers and treatments available in the NHS in general, and MFT in particular. Their enthusiasm, intelligent questioning and vision was at times breath-taking, and always stimulating. 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10th birthday celebrations

The Royal Manchester Children's Hospital (RMCH), Saint Mary's Hospital (SMH), Manchester Royal Eye Hospital (MREH) and Manchester Royal Infirmary (MRI) extension, all marked a very special milestone this year and celebrated 10 years since they first opened on Oxford Road in 2009.

RMCH kick-started the festivities in June with a month of birthday celebrations arranged with families, staff, volunteers and patrons. The first patient admitted to RMCH on its opening day in 2009, 11-year-old Rijul Sudhir was invited back to the hospital with a warm welcome and a tour of the hospital by Lead Nurse at RMCH, Walter Tann. Rijul was accompanied by his mum Jaya, a nurse at Manchester Royal Infirmary (MRI).

The hospital also celebrated with various events and competitions including; magic makers, superheroes, school choirs, ward competitions, storm troopers and copious amounts of cake. The celebrations were topped off with a staff awards and ball, celebrating the hard work of all RMCH staff and teams across the last year.

Saint Mary's Hospital marked their birthday celebrations in July with an afternoon tea party on the Newborn Intensive Care Unit



(NICU), inviting former patients, nurses and doctors back to the ward as part of the anniversary. The first babies that were admitted on NICU returned with their families to meet some of the original staff members who treated them a decade ago.

In August, MREH held a celebration event for all staff

to not only mark the 10th anniversary of the Eye Hospital opening, but to also celebrate their recent CQC 'Outstanding' Rating – the first Eye hospital in the UK to receive this rating.

MRI staff also marked 10 years since the opening of the new extension at the hospital with events throughout the month.

Next phase of world-leading genomics hub takes shape

Manchester Science Partnerships (MSP) has announced that work has started on Citylabs 2.0, the first phase of its £60million extension of the Citylabs campus, which will be at the heart of Greater Manchester's new globally-leading genomics campus for innovation, precision medicine, translational science, and molecular diagnostics.

Located within Europe's largest clinical-academic campus, Citylabs 2.0 is surrounded by the Manchester Royal Infirmary, Royal Manchester Children's Hospital, Saint Mary's Hospital and Manchester Royal Eye Hospital and will build on the success of Citylabs 1.0 which has been fully let since its completion in 2015 and has already showcased a unique new way of collaborative working between industry, academia and clinicians. A Joint Venture partnership between



MSP and MFT, the 92,000 sq ft development is due for completion by the end of 2020.

Manchester's new genomics campus will create more than 1,500 high value jobs over the next decade, adding over £150million to the city region's economy. Crucially,

it will positively impact the lives of over three million people by providing access to new diagnostics and more targeted treatments through pioneering research, and will see these products and services adopted into the city's health service at a much faster rate.

Greater Manchester residents benefit from week-round pacemaker access

Greater Manchester residents can now be fitted with a pacemaker seven days a week thanks to co-operative working from hospitals across MFT. This is the first time such a service has been made possible in the UK outside of London, and has come about thanks to collaboration from the cardiology teams at Wythenshawe Hospital and Manchester Royal Infirmary.

The operation is a relatively straightforward process that's usually carried out under local anaesthetic. The pacemaker is most often placed under the skin near the collarbone, attached to a wire that's guided to the heart. The procedure usually takes about an hour, and most people are able to leave hospital within a day after the surgery.

Now heart specialists at MFT have devised a staff structure across Wythenshawe Hospital and Manchester Royal Infirmary that means a cardiologist and other essential staff will be available to carry out the procedure week-round.

Dr Niall Campbell, Consultant Cardiologist at Wythenshawe Hospital said: "This new provision has come about thanks to a pioneering way of working between staff at Manchester Royal Infirmary

and Wythenshawe Hospital. Now patients in our hospitals can have access to a pacemaker any day of the week, meaning we can treat them more safely and get them home quicker.

"This was made possible thanks to the merger that created MFT back in 2017, enabling hospitals under the Trust to work more closely together and combine services like these to the benefit of our patients."

Pupils unveil 'stop smoking' poster designs

A group of pupils from Newall Green Primary School in Wythenshawe designed a set of creative posters encouraging patients and visitors at Wythenshawe Hospital to give up smoking.

The posters, which have now been installed at entrances around the site to deter people from smoking feature facts about the dangers of smoking and heartfelt messages from the children about guitting. The designs



came about after Dr Matt Evison, Consultant in Respiratory Medicine at Wythenshawe Hospital, visited the school to give a talk about the dangers of smoking.

Pupils Ella, Grace and Zack, all

aged 10, revealed the posters in an unveiling ceremony, where they were joined by Dr Evison, Wythenshawe Hospital Chief Executive Mandy Bailey and Ruth Perry, Head of School at Newall Green.

NIHR Manchester BRC highlights great progress in its second year

The NIHR Manchester Biomedical Research Centre (BRC), hosted by MFT, in partnership with The University of Manchester, The Christie NHS Foundation Trust and Salford Royal NHS Foundation Trust seeks to drive health improvements and lasting change for all through creative, inclusive and pro-active research that identifies and bridges gaps between new discoveries and individualised

Its recently published second annual report highlighted impressive achievements in its pioneering research across Manchester in cancer, inflammation, and regenerative medicine, including over 300 investigators, staff and trainees who are now being supported (directly or indirectly) by the Manchester BRC infrastructure.

Nearly 19,000 patients were recruited into studies and trials, a 370% increase from the previous year, and 192 projects were operating across the BRC - almost doubling the total in the second 12 months.

External funding leveraged by the BRC, to assist in research to improve the lives of people in Manchester and beyond, totalled £65.9 million – a 15% increase from 2017/18.

Success as sight-saving eye clinics provide more than 10,000 treatments in the first year

Specialist sight-saving community eye clinics in North and South Manchester, brought to the high street in May 2018 by the Manchester Royal Eye Hospital (MREH), have provided more than 10,000 additional treatment appointments to patients in their first year of opening.

The clinics deliver care for patients closer to where they live, with a focus towards patients with wet age related macular degeneration (AMD), the leading cause of irreversible sight loss in the UK.

John Ashcroft, Chief Executive at Manchester Royal Eye Hospital said: "Expanding our services has proved invaluable for our patients and our community eye clinics still remain amongst the first in the country to offer this level of treatment, in the heart of the community."

The community eye clinics are located in the Cheetham Hill shopping centre, North Manchester, and in Wythenshawe Civic Centre in South Manchester. MREH are also developing a new purpose-built area at Trafford General Hospital, to treat people from the surrounding area who require regular injections for AMD. The sight-saving centre, is due to open its doors later in 2019.

Celebrating our volunteers

We celebrated National Volunteers Week in June and thanked our wonderful MFT volunteers for the valuable contribution they make to our patients, visitors, carers and staff. We have more than 1,300 registered volunteers who work across the Trust in a huge range of roles, including meeting and greeting patients as they arrive at hospital, assisting as a dining companion, helping with interpretation and translation, and providing information and helping people to way-find at a time when they may be feeling anxious.

We held afternoon tea parties to recognise and thank our volunteers for their contribution, hosted by our Chairman, Kathy Cowell OBE DL. Volunteers were presented with a certificate of appreciation and an 'I am an MFT Volunteer' pin badge. The event also included the premiere of a special film about our volunteers and the impact they have to improve both patient and staff experience.





Young People's Open Day

In June more than 500 young people attended our 10th annual Young People's Open Day, which is organised by the Foundation Trust Membership Team. We had an excellent selection of stands covering a wide range of MFT's services including Nursing, Medical Illustration, Laboratories, Orthopaedics, Specialised Play Services, Mental Health Services and many more.

Visitors had the chance to find out about becoming a Trust Member, complete a questionnaire to help inform the MFT Forward Plan, and find out about NHS careers. Our Chairman, Kathy Cowell OBE DL, and some of our Governors attended the event to meet attendees and hear their views.

Lung Health Checks launched to improve lung cancer survival rates

In April clinicians at
Wythenshawe Hospital
launched 'Lung Health Checks',
a new initiative to help improve
early diagnosis for lung
cancer and other respiratory
conditions across North and
East Manchester.

The first-of-their-kind mobile Lung Health Check support units and CT vehicles will be placed in key community-based locations for the next two years – including at the Etihad Stadium, Cheetham Hill, Harpurhey and Failsworth.

Dr Richard Booton, Clinical Director of Lung Cancer and Thoracic Surgery at Wythenshawe Hospital, said; "Lung Cancer is the leading cause of premature death in Manchester and a major issue in the treatment of lung cancers is that they are often not identified until a late stage, at which point the chances of survival lower significantly.

"This new initiative allows us to test people who are at a higher risk of lung conditions, regardless



of whether they've noticed any symptoms, enabling us to diagnose lung cancer and other respiratory conditions at a much earlier and more treatable stage. Tests are quick and non-invasive, and located in easily accessible areas in the community."

In May the team completed the 1,000th Lung Health Check and was recently named Cancer Care Team of the year at the BMJ Awards.

MFT one of the first centres in the UK to offer new cutting edge cancer treatment

MFT has been named as one of a very small number of centres in the UK to offer a revolutionary new cancer treatment, widely regarded as the most exciting cancer treatment development in decades.

MFT will be able to offer the ground-breaking treatment to children and adults and is unique

in this regard. Within MFT, the treatment will be delivered in Royal Manchester Children's Hospital and Manchester Royal Infirmary.

CAR-T (Chimeric Antigen Receptor T-cell) therapy is a personalised medicine used to treat patients with certain types of leukaemia and lymphoma. It is a highly complex new type of immunotherapy which involves collecting and using the patients' own immune cells to target their cancer in a process which is completed over a number of weeks.

Both hospitals can provide the treatment with immediate effect, with Manchester Royal Infirmary being the first centre in the UK to offer this treatment to young adults with leukaemia.



MFT are frontrunners in staff health and wellbeing

Building on the success of last year, more than 650 MFT staff took part in the Great Manchester Run as part of Team MFT this year, and were instantly recognisable as part of the NHS blue wave. Colleagues ran, walked, jogged or used a wheelchair to complete the 10km course. Dozens of other staff and volunteers were front and centre on the day to cheer them on, hand out water or volunteer their services in the medical tent.

Our Manchester NHS blue wave was the first in the country, set up last year in partnership with the Great Run Company, and has since inspired them to work with other NHS Trusts nationwide on similar initiatives to improve staff health and wellbeing.

iMRI scanner appeal update

Last year, Royal Manchester Children's Hospital Charity launched a £4million appeal to transform children's brain surgery at the hospital by funding a stateof-the-art intra-operative MRI (iMRI) scanning suite.

This scanning suite will allow patients to be scanned during surgery, giving surgeons a real time view of the brain whilst surgery is taking place, and potentially resulting in less surgeries and a much shorter wait to see if treatment has been a success.

The Charity is delighted to announce that to date, they are well on their way to achieving their target of £4million within their two year timeframe.
They have raised an incredible £1.89million to date, plus a further pledge of £1million from Manchester-based employment law specialists Peninsula.

Fred Done donates **£1.25million for new scanner**

Betfred boss Fred Done donated £1.25million to go towards the new scanner. The funds were raised following Fred's pledge to donate



all profits from over-the-counter bets made on the first day of the Cheltenham Festival, one of the busiest days in the horse racing calendar. The appeal particularly resonated with family man Fred as he lost his wife Mo last year after she was diagnosed with a brain tumour.

Construction work begins on new helipad

Construction work on the new state-of-the-art, £3.9million helipad has begun. The new helicopter landing site, being built on the roof of Grafton Street car park on Oxford Road will enable critically ill or injured babies, children and adults to be airlifted straight to four major MFT hospitals.

A high-level patient transfer corridor will connect the helipad landing site to Manchester Royal Infirmary (MRI), Royal Manchester Children's Hospital (RMCH), Saint Mary's Hospital and Manchester Royal Eye Hospital. The construction of the helipad is expected to see an estimated 312 patients airlifted to the site each year.

Funding for the helipad was raised by MFT Charity's Time Save Lives Appeal, which raised a



phenomenal £3.9million in just 12 months, thanks to the dedication and generosity of its supporters. This included a generous donation of £1.3million from the County Air Ambulance Trust's HELP (Helicopter Emergency Landing Pads) Appeal and £1.1million from the government's LIBOR fines funds in the Chancellor's Budget.

Dr Jon Simpson, Medical Director and Consultant Physician at Manchester Royal Infirmary, added: "The quality and speed of specialist medical care following a major trauma injury is vital to ensuring our patients have the best chance of a full recovery. In these situations, patients need to be transferred to a Major Trauma Centre or an Emergency Department, both of which we have on site at MRI and RMCH.

"The construction of the helipad will be invaluable to us and our patients as in some situations; the quickest or most appropriate way to get a patient to these services is by helicopter. The ease of access to these specialist services once the helipad is fully operational will allow our hospitals to save many more lives and increase the chances of a full or improved level of recovery for our patients."

Building work began in June 2019 and the helipad is set to be fully operational in 2020.
